THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES October 28, 2024 DRAFT

I. Meeting called to order at 6:32 pm. Lou gave the opening prayer.

II. Approval of the September 23, 2024 meeting minutes: Pastor Luke moved to approve, John seconded, passed.

III. Public comments - None

IV. Board Reports

- A. Board of Charitable Giving Jack Butterick
 - Thank you to the members/friends of FCC for your generous contributions so that we were able to give to many organization in Newaygo County: Compassion Home/Fremont, HERE Hygiene/Inspire/Fremont, NC Prevention of Child Abuse/White Cloud, Community Closet/Fremont, Love, Inc./Rooms of Refuge/Fremont, Empowerment/Fremont, Hope 101 Ministry, Insight Pregnancy/Fremont, Vera's House/Newaygo, Wellspring/Fremont as well as additional contributions to the Crop Walk. The final number for the Crop Walk was \$1405 ranking us #5 out of 18 participants. Church of the Living Christ and All Saints were the top 2 contributors with a total of \$21,961. \$5,500 stays in Newaygo County. Our budget for 2025 is \$3500.00.
- B. Board of Deacon's Ruth Cowles

Rooms for Refuge stayed at the church in October. Autumn Sunday was well attended. Pastor Luke and Lou attended the Gideon's Banquet. The Chosen has started weekly Sunday evenings at 5:00. Board approved vacation days for Pastor Luke: October 16, 24, 25. The website needs to prep for fall and Advent. Discussed the all church meeting. Discussed the vision of the church and how to move forward. Accepted Bernie's withdrawal of membership from the Deacons.

C. Board of Christian Education – Pastor Luke

There has been consistent attendance of 3 children. The group is working on attending church a number of times to earn a 21 scoop Sundae. The injury to a child on October 21 was minor.

D. Board of Trustees - John Cooper

The squirrel damage to the outer door has been fixed. We will probably have to replace the doors in the next 2 to 3 years. The doors are sagging. The gutters containing the little trees have been cleaned out. September is 75% of the year. Income is at 65% because we have not had to take as much money out of investments. Expenses are at 66%.

E. Women's Fellowship-Jean Morehouse

Met at the beginning of the month. The spaghetti dinner for the CROP walk was well attended. The new handrail is installed and it is being used. There was a purchase of a new crock pot to be used for church functions. Coffee hour supplies have been moved to the old AV room along with several kitchen supplies. Looking to purchase new table clothes for luncheons. Looking to purchase enough for all the table. The table clothes will replace the old lace ones. Gearing up for the craft show in December. We will be renaming the "Plum Pudding Shop". Suggestions welcome.

F. Men's Fellowship - Lou

Men's Fellowship has their lunches and guest speakers planned for the next few months. Nothing else to report.

G. Technology Board – No Report

Lou brought up the topic of training for the Tech Booth and getting an easier way to download the service to You Tube. Lou will look into it.

H. Music Committee-Pastor Luke We will have special music in November with Stacy, Jack, and Karen singing on Sunday November 2. Matt's niece will be November 9.

V. Pastor's Report-Pastor Luke

The Chosen began 2 weeks ago. It is going well. Last month Pastor had 3 days of vacation. Hay Art has wrapped up. We have the canvas that was left over to use. It will be stored in the banner room. It can have removable stickers applied. Women's and Men's Fellowship will collaborate to put posts up in grass by the front of the church by the road so that other banners can be put up at different times of the year. John recommended that Men's and Women's Fellowship talk about it and get a cost. Hoping to be done before the ground freezes so we can advertise for Christmas and Easter. Another Hope Initiative will be starting in November. All Saints Sunday will be November 2. There will be pictures on the altar and a slide show of members that have passed away this year. Judy Nadeau's wedding is happening

in November. Rooms for Refuge will be November 18 - 25. Holding off the next visit until Spring so more members can help. November 24 is Christ the King Sunday. The next Sunday after that is Advent. There will be an all-church meeting November 17, with a follow-up meeting in February.

VII. Old Business-None


VIII. New Business

*Barb Hunsucker, Kay Cummings Clouse and Gail Tilley (our super fundraisers) raised over \$8645 collectively.


*Crop Hunger Walk infro was shared at a Community Worship Service, a "Bee the Change" Library program and sharing at Green Acres.

From Pastor Luke:



November brings two contrasting days: Thanksgiving, my favorite holiday, and Black Friday, my least favorite. Thanksgiving is a celebration of gratitude, family, and reflection, a holiday that has resisted commercialization. Unlike Christmas, where decorations appear months in advance, Thanksgiving remains simply a day to gather and appreciate what we already have. It's about pausing from daily life to enjoy a meal, share memories, and express thanks for the blessings in our lives.

In stark contrast, Black Friday immediately shifts the focus to shopping and consumerism, often casting aside the gratitude felt the day before. This day emphasizes getting what we don't have, hunting for deals, and finding the "perfect" items. While Thanksgiving centers on values like contentment and gratitude, Black Friday promotes a kind of frenzy to acquire more. The two holidays stand as opposites—one draws us toward a selfless appreciation, while the other can steer us toward a sense of lack and desire.

Gratitude, particularly, is also essential in the Christian life. Each week, Christians gather to give thanks for God's blessings, lifting praises from a place of thankfulness and humility. This practice of gratitude is more than a seasonal tradition; it's a lifestyle that shapes a person's view of the world, encouraging contentment and a generous spirit.

As we move through this season, it's worth reflecting on which mindset resonates more. Are we inclined toward being Thanksgiving people, marked by gratitude and fulfillment, or Black Friday people, always seeking the next acquisition? Cultivating gratitude might not come with a shopping cart, but it brings a far deeper richness to our lives.
